Can We Enjoy Life and Still be a Faithful Servant? Newsletter Theme: Miscellaneous Topics

God's lovingkindness has given us all things to enjoy (Eccl.5:18-19)! Yet, we're also encouraged to grow and know who we are in Christ, our purpose on earth, and how to stay focused above. Actually, our body is to be a living sacrifice unto God (Rom. 12:1). We're to run 'the race of life' to attain the prize: "Know ye not that they which run in a race run all, but one receiveth the prize? so run, that ye may obtain." (I Cor. 9:24). This relates to growing, but also obtaining rewards for labor we do, working with God as His ambassador (I Cor. 3:14).

The inward desire to enjoy life is strong (Gal. 5:17), yet the Lord Jesus' blood sacrifice redeemed us and we are not our own: "For ye are bought with a price: therefore glorify God in your body, and in your spirit, which are God's." (I Cor. 6:20). So, how can we allow our Lord Jesus Christ to live through us and still enjoy life?

While Scripture teaches that we are under grace and free to live as we choose, love constrains us to yield to do ministry and serve our Father. (II Cor 5:14). It can be a battle between our flesh and the Spirit (Gal. 5:17). God left us here on His behalf to help others grow, and further their joy: "And having this confidence, I know that I shall abide and continue with you all for your furtherance and joy of faith." (Phil. 1:25)

When we dwell on sound doctrine, it enables us to bring into captivity our thoughts to the obedience of Christ (II Cor. 10:5). Thankfulness increases for all the Lord has done and we begin to see life differently. Serving God doesn't have to be drudgery or an all or none approach. We can learn to joy in our new life in Christ.

Actually, the weighty burden of feeling we 'have to' serve God all day can create a fear, which puts us under the law. It inhibits us from living unto God, even feeling guilty when we enjoy life. This fear is similar to what the Corinthians faced, wanting to take pleasure in carnal things, while avoiding the challenges of being a faithful servant. Instead, they gave themselves over to their lusts, not serving God at all, degrading into things not even named among the Gentiles (I Cor. 5:1).

Refections: Why So Much Focus on Romans

A few saints wondered why we have spent so much time in 'Just a Minute,' studying Romans. Two key reasons are listed below:

1) To provide a firm understanding of the foundation of the gospel of Christ: Romans is the first book of a series of books written by Paul to the Church, the Body of Christ. His epistles are laid out in the perfect order for our edification. This first book provides the essential foundation, onto which all others are based. Thus, it is imperative to get a thorough understanding and application of this key material. It helps the reader to gain the basics to obtain the mind of Christ (I Cor. 2:16). Paul knew the best way for saints to learn, "...until Christ be formed in you..." (Gal. 4:19) Romans (as all of Paul's epistles) is laid forth progressively as a curriculum to mature us. Basic components:

Justification (Romans 1-5)
Sanctification (Romans 6-8)
How we fit into God's plan (Romans 9-11)
New form of worship/service (Rom. 12-16)

2) To help others see the application of the Truth, written to the Body of Christ, revealed to us in layers, over time: God's Word can't be attained in one review. It is His deep, eternal wisdom, having complexities that need time to be digested/applied over time. Therefore, after writing general articles about each chapter, we decided to go through it a second time to address practical application issues to help readers see its relevance to their lives. The first time reading through a book, many get a surface, intellectual understanding. The next few times through, more detail is acquired, which refines or fills in understanding, and can provide insight to apply to life details.

What is next? 'Just A Minute' plans to address how to apply teachings from I Corinthians. To prepare, read through the book on your own, led by the Spirit, to see what God the Spirit reveals to you.

Do We Really Need to Know Study Skills?

There are a multitude of 'study skills' that are taught by God within the Bible. They enable students to glean what He has placed there for us. Many are listed in "Exploring the Bible Using Study Tools," which can be purchased on Amazon. A few examples:

1. Looking back-Study skill #16: Read *Romans 1* to observe how many times Paul refers us back in Scripture. He may make mention of a prior Scripture, refer to a promise or event that happened in the past, or even mention a person from the Old Testament. For example, in verse 5, do you know when Paul received 'grace

and apostleship?' (Acts 9) Also, notice verse 25. When did man first worship the creature instead of God? (Gen. 3)

- **2. Goal of a book-Study skill #8:** The goal of Paul's epistles can be found in the first chapter, often in a prayer. Read through Romans 1 to locate the goal.
- **3.** Application of Scripture-Study skill #1: Once you understand what a verse says, reread it to think about how it can apply in your life. For example, Romans 6:1-2: "What shall we say then? Shall we continue in sin, that grace may abound? God forbid..." Do I really know what sin is and am I continuing in sin as a believer? Pray and meditate on the passage to make needed changes.

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This fleshly thinking approach focuses on behavior, concentrating on the potential loss or how much change is needed. This will lead to pressure and anxiety, putting ourselves under the law. Our imagination sets us up to be immobilized by fear and failure. Candidly, the fear of losing the fun of life as we serve God is a stronghold and needs to be taken down. "(For the weapons of our warfare are not carnal, but mighty through God to the pulling down of strong holds;) Casting down imaginations, and every high thing that exalteth itself against the knowledge of God, and bringing into captivity every thought to the obedience of Christ." (II Cor. 10:4-5) Only by the Word dwelling within, can we lead our thoughts captive to learn a new joy, that is, working with our Father. When analyzed, the fear wall is a set of lies we tell ourselves and vain imaginations. These magnify our fears and potential problems, derailing us and preventing us from experiencing joy in our glorious life in Christ.

God's instruction to us is to renew our mind and replace law thinking with ongoing meditation on who we are in Christ and 'the mighty weapons of our warfare.' Then, the problem is no longer exalted, instead God and His power is elevated. Focus on one decision and moment at a time, while yielding and doing God's work in love. Avoid walking by sight and instead, redeem the time (Rom. 13), walking through the 'fear wall' (barrier) by faith. Continue progressing forward and before you know it you are on the other side of the fear wall, looking back. In most cases, it wasn't really as hard as you thought it would be and actually encourages growth (Romans 5:3-5).

The answer seems to be understanding and growing in grace, thinking and responding with the mind of Christ. Saints aren't 'required' to give up all things they like to live godly; this is legalism. Instead over time, God changes and matures us to live unto Him. We are to dwell on the Word (Rom. 8:10-13) and walk by faith to do what God instructs. Then we can reflect and adjust as we grow. Our desires will be transformed, gradually joying to do things for Him, delighting in ministry and being an ambassador. Christ becomes exalted in our thinking and we actually give up nothing. What we enjoy is replaced. Serving ourselves diminishes when the Spirit leads and conforms us to His image. Thankfulness increases, so we choose to lay aside fleshly issues to walk by faith to please our Father (Romans 6).

Reflect: Make the choice to see your fears differently; don't let them lead. It's an opportunity for the power of Christ to work in your inner man. This is a glory-producing opportunity. Trust God in you and take the challenge to run the race of life by faith! "For this cause also thank we God without ceasing, because, when ye received the word of God which ye heard of us, ye received it not as the word of men, but as it is in truth, the word of God, which effectually worketh also in you that believe." (I Thess. 2:13) As we do this in faith, glory is revealed and His power rests upon us. (Romans 8:18)
